Whisper of the Heart (In Japanese with subtitles)—Directed by Yoshifumi Kondô; screenplay by Hayao Miyazaki. Based on a manga by Aoi Hiragi. The film is rated G.

This 1995 film from the internationally famous Studio Ghibli is a beloved favorite among fans of the studio's works. *Whisper of the Heart* is a marvelous coming of age story of Shizuku, a junior high school girl who decides to challenge herself by taking on an ambitious project at a time when children in Japan are usually focusing on preparing for high school entrance exams. Reading and the love of books play a major role in this story, especially the circulation system in the local public and school libraries. Beautifully animated, the Japanese title is *Mimi wo Sumaseba*,

which means *If You Listen Closely*. If you listen and watch closely, this film will touch your heart. This was the only film Yoshifumi Kondô was to direct before his death in his late 40s. There will be an introduction by Gilles Poitras, a writer specializing in Japanese animation, who will cover some of the Japanese cultural elements in the film; afterwards there will be a question and answer session.
